One reason for this large attention is the strange narrative form due to the combination of the Indian "storytelling," myth, poetry and a plot that takes place in a

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modern western¹ environment. Another reason for the remarkable success of this novel is Silko's way to show the negative repercussions on Native Americans caused by racism, alcoholism, dislocation, poverty as well as the industrial exploitation of the land. In this paper I will discuss one of the principal themes presented in Leslie Silko's Ceremony: the issue of Native American identity.
