How to Format Dialogue in an Essay
Apply double quotation marks when signifying that character uses speech.
When using quotes in quotes, use single quotation marks.
If conversation extends across more than one paragraph, implement quotation marks right where each paragraph starts.

How to Write Dialogue in an Essay: Usage, Formatting ...

Simply indicate at the top of the scene what language the characters are speaking in.
Then, when they stop speaking in a foreign language, add END SUBTITLES in an action line, like this:
It doesn’t really matter how you indicate a scene’s dialogue is all in a foreign language as long as it’s clear.

How to Format Dialogue in a Screenplay: Top 8 Dialogue ...

Most American authors tend to use double quotation marks as their default for dialogue, while British authors tend to use single quotation marks.
However, you must pick one and stick with it.
If you start with single for dialogue, then use single all throughout your book.
If you start with double, then stick with that.

If the dialogue contains one person relating more than one paragraph, each paragraph of the quote begins with opening quotation marks.
The closing quotation marks are placed only at the end of the final paragraph of dialogue.
Any other paragraphs within the quote do not have closing quotation marks.

How to Format Dialogue in APA | Pen and the Pad

For interior dialogue, italics are appropriate, just be consistent.
Do I really love her? he thought.
If a quotation extends to more than one paragraph, do not use end quotes at the close of the first paragraph.
Use them only when a character is finished speaking:
“and in the end, I didn’t even love her. I did think of marrying her, though.”

Learn How to Punctuate Dialogue in Fiction Writing

If the speech is tagged with a “she said” or “he said,” you’ll use a comma inside the quotation marks.
“1 love writing books,” he said.
If the speech has no dialogue tag (he said or she said) or if it’s followed by an action, there’s no need for a comma before the quotation marks.
“1 love writing books.”.

How to Write & Punctuate Dialogue in Your Story w/Examples

Using Block Quotes.
When quoting dialogue from a novel, set the quotation off from your text as a block if each character’s speech starts on a new line in the source.
Indent the extract half an inch from the left margin, as you would any block quotation.
If a character’s speech runs onto a new line, as it does below, indent each line of dialogue an additional half an inch.

WHAT IS THE STORY GRID?
The Story Grid is a tool developed by editor Shawn Coyne to analyze stories and provide helpful editorial comments.
It’s like a CT Scan that takes a photo of the global story and tells the editor or writer what is working, what is not, and what must be done to make what works better and fix what’s not.
The Story Grid breaks down the component parts of stories to identify the problems.
And finding the problems in a story is almost as difficult as the writing of the story itself (maybe even more difficult).
The Story Grid is a tool with many applications:
1. It will tell a writer if a Story ?works? or ?doesn’t work.
2. It pinpoints story problems but does not emotionally abuse the writer, revealing exactly where a Story (not the person creating the Story/the Story) has failed.
3. It will tell the writer the specific work necessary to fix that Story’s problems.
4. It is a tool to re-envision and resuscitate a seemingly irredeemable pile of paper stuck in an attic drawer.
5. It is a tool that can inspire an original creation.
