A collection of speeches and essays from the acclaimed Jamaican political activist, publisher, journalist, and orator hailed as “Black Moses.” A selection of Marcus Garvey's addresses and writings, *The Philosophy and Opinions of Marcus Garvey* was originally compiled by his widow, Amy Jacques Garvey, to keep track of her husband's opinions and sayings over his career.
